1 Test Specifications, General Procedures, and Location

1.1 Test Specification and General Procedures

Apollo America, Inc. has determined that the equipment under test is subject to the rules and directives above at the date of this testing. 1.2 Test Location and Equipment Used

Test Location The EUT was fully tested by **The University of Michigan Radiation Laboratory**, 3228 EECS Building, Ann Arbor, Michigan 48109-2122 USA. The Test Facility description and attenuation characteristics are on file with the FCC Laboratory, Columbia, Maryland (FCC Reg. No: 91050) and with Industry Canada, Ottawa, ON (File Ref. No: IC 2057A-1).

Test Equipment Pertinent test equipment used for measurements at this facility is listed in Table 1. The quality system employed at The University of Michigan Radiation Laboratory has been established to ensure all equipment has a clearly identifiable classification, calibration expiry date, and that all calibrations are traceable to the SI through NIST, other recognized national laboratories, accepted fundamental or natural physical constants, ratio type of calibration, or by comparison to consensus standards.

2 Configuration and Identification of the Equipment Under Test

2.1 Description and Declarations

The EUT is a wireless carbon monoxide alarm. The EUT is approximately 16 x 16 x 4 cm in dimension, and is depicted in Figure 1. It is powered by a 3 VDC Lithium cell battery. In use, this device is affixed in a residential setting. Table 2 outlines provider declared EUT specifications.

2.1.1 EUT Configuration

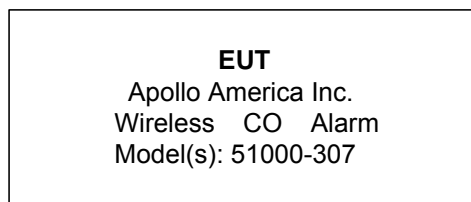


Figure 2: EUT Test Configuration Diagram.

The EUT is configured for testing as depicted in Figure 2.

2.1.2 Modes of Operation

The EUT is capable of three key modes of operation: MANUAL mode, ALARM mode, and HEARTBEAT mode. In MANUAL mode the EUT transmits two packets of 6 frames when the batteries are first inserted, and again when the unit is attached to its mounting plate (via depression of a built-in switch). In HEARTBEAT mode (non-emergency system integrity mode) the EUT transmits a single packet of 6 frames approximately once every 65 minutes to ensure safety system integrity. In ALARM mode, the EUT transmits two packets of 6 frames approximately every 5 seconds during the alarm state.

2.1.3 Variants

There is only a single variant of the EUT, as tested.

2.1.4 Test Samples

Two samples in total were provided. One normal sample capable of MANUAL, ALARM, and HEARTBEAT modes, and a second sample to take apart for photos.

2.1.5 Functional Exerciser

Normal operating EUT functionality was verified by observation of transmitted signal.

2.1.6 Modifications Made

There were no modifications made to the EUT by this laboratory.

2.1.7 Production Intent

The EUT appears to be a production ready sample.

2.1.8 Declared Exemptions and Additional Product Notes

The EUT employs some modes of operation that alert the user in the event of an emergency. Such alert modes fall under FCC 15.231(a)(4), and may operate during the pendency of the alarm condition. The EUT employs some modes of operation that are system integrity modes. Such alert modes fall under FCC 15.231(a)(3).

3 Emissions

3.1 General Test Procedures

3.1.1 Radiated Test Setup and Procedures

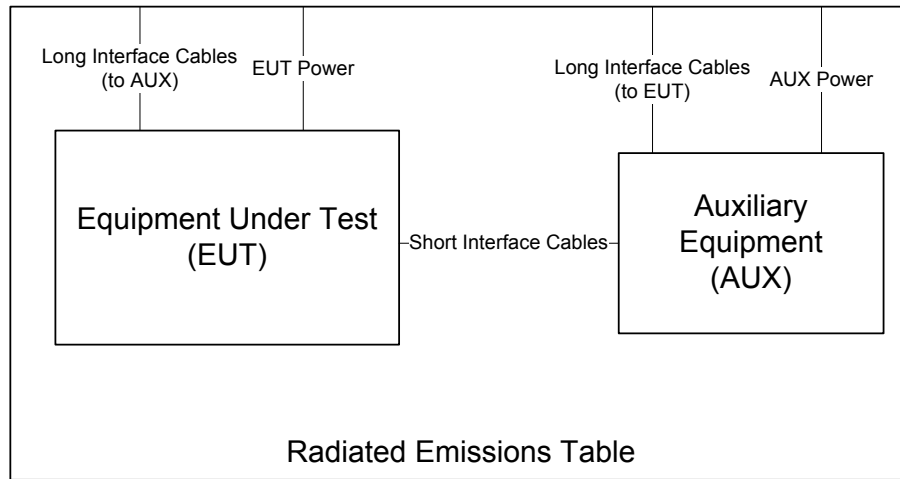


Figure 3: Radiated Emissions Diagram of the EUT.

Radiated electromagnetic emissions from the EUT are first evaluated in our shielded fully anechoic chamber. Spectrum and modulation characteristics of all emissions are recorded, and emissions above 1 GHz are fully characterized. The anechoic chamber contains a set-up similar to that of our outdoor 3-meter site, with a turntable and antenna mast. Instrumentation, including spectrum analyzers and other test equipment as detailed in Section 1.2 are employed. After indoor pre-scans, emission measurements are made on our outdoor 3-meter Open Area Test Site (OATS). If the EUT connects to auxiliary equipment and is table or floor standing, the configurations prescribed in ANSI C63.4 / CISPR-22 are followed. Alternatively, a layout closest to normal use (as declared by the provider) is employed if the resulting emissions appear to be worst-case in such a configuration. See Figure 3. All

intentionally radiating elements that are not fixed-mounted in use are placed on the test table lying flat, on their side, and on their end (3-axes) and the resulting worst case emissions are recorded. If the EUT is fixed-mounted in use, measurements are made with the device oriented in the manner consistent with installation and then emissions are recorded.

If the EUT exhibits spurious emissions due to internal receiver circuitry, such emissions are measured with an appropriate carrier signal applied. For devices with intentional emissions below 30 MHz, a shielded loop antenna is used as the test antenna. It is placed at a 1 meter receive height and appropriate low frequency magnetic field extrapolation to the regulatory limit distance is employed. Emissions between 30 MHz and 1 GHz are measured using tuned dipoles and/or calibrated broadband antennas. For both horizontal and vertical polarizations, the test antenna is raised and lowered from 1 to 4 m in height until a maximum emission level is detected. The EUT is then rotated through 360° in azimuth until the highest emission is detected. The test antenna is then raised and lowered one last time from 1 to 4 m and the worst case value is recorded. Emissions above 1 GHz are characterized using standard gain horn antennas or calibrated broadband ridge-horn antennas on our OATS with a 2.4m x 2.4m square of H-4 absorber placed over the ground screen between the EUT and the test antenna. Care is taken to ensure that test receiver resolution and video bandwidths meet the regulatory requirements, and that the emission bandwidth of the EUT is not reduced. Photographs of the test setup employed are depicted in Figure 4.

Where regulations allow for direct measurement of field strength, power values (dBm) measured on the test receiver / analyzer are converted to dBμV/m at the regulatory distance, using

$$E_{dist} = 107 + P_R + K_A - K_G + K_E - C_F$$

where P_R is the power recorded on spectrum analyzer, in dBm, K_A is the test antenna factor in dB/m, K_G is the combined pre-amplifier gain and cable loss in dB, K_E is duty correction factor (when applicable) in dB, and C_F is

a distance conversion (employed only if limits are specified at alternate distance) in dB. This field strength value is then compared with the regulatory limit. If effective isotropic radiated power (EIRP) is compute, it is computed as

$$EIRP(dBm) = E_{3m}(dB\mu V/m) - 95.2.$$

When presenting data at each frequency, the highest measured emission under all possible EUT orientations (3-axes) is reported.

3.1.2 Conducted Emissions Test Setup and Procedures

Battery Power Conducted Spurious The EUT is not subject to measurement of power line conducted emissions as it is powered solely by its internal battery.

3.1.3 Power Supply Variation

Tests at extreme supply voltages are made if required by the the procedures specified in the test standard, and results of this testing are detailed in this report.

In the case the EUT is designed for operation from a battery power source, the extreme test voltages are evaluated over the range specified in the test standard; no less than $\pm 10\%$ of the nominal battery voltage declared by the manufacturer. For all battery operated equipment, worst case intentional and spurious emissions are re-checked employing a new (fully charged) battery.

3.2 Intentional Emissions

3.2.1 Fundamental Emission Pulsed Operation

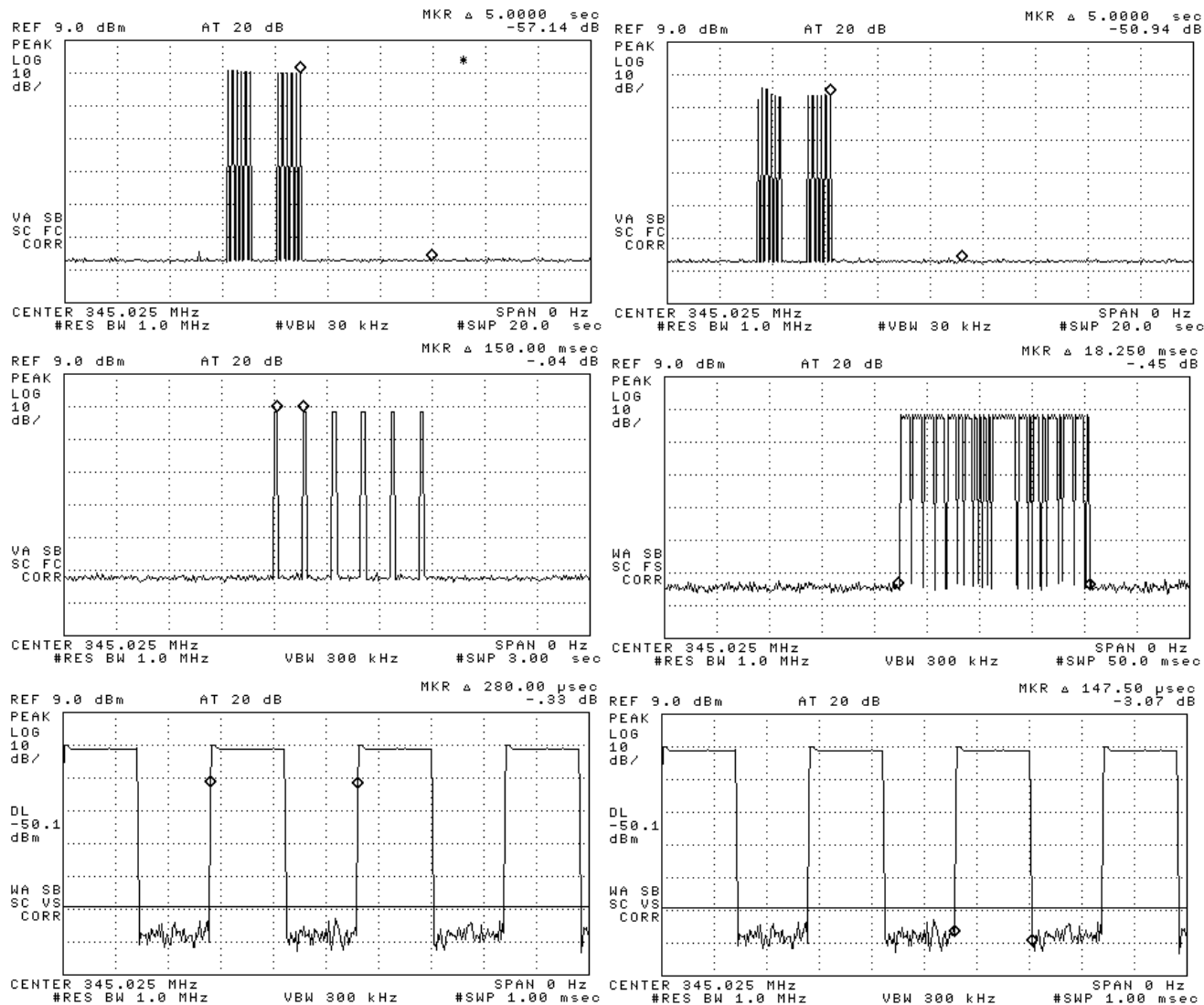


Figure 5(a): Pulsed Emission Characteristics (Duty Cycle).

The details and results of testing the EUT for pulsed operation are summarized in Table 3. Plots showing the measurements made to obtain these values are provided in Figure 5.

Table 3: Pulsed Emission Characteristics (Duty Cycle).

In MANUAL mode the EUT transmits two packets of 6 frames if the battery is inserted or when mounted to its bracket. Only a single frame may occur in any given 100ms window. Each frame consists of 18.25 ms of Manchester encoded ASK data with an duty of 0.1475 ms / 0.2800 ms. (See subfigure (a).) In HEARTBEAT mode the EUT transmits a single packet of the same 6 frames approximately once every 65 minutes to ensure safety system integrity. (See subfigure (b).) In ALARM mode, the EUT transmits the same two packets of 6 frames approximately every 5 seconds during the alarm state.

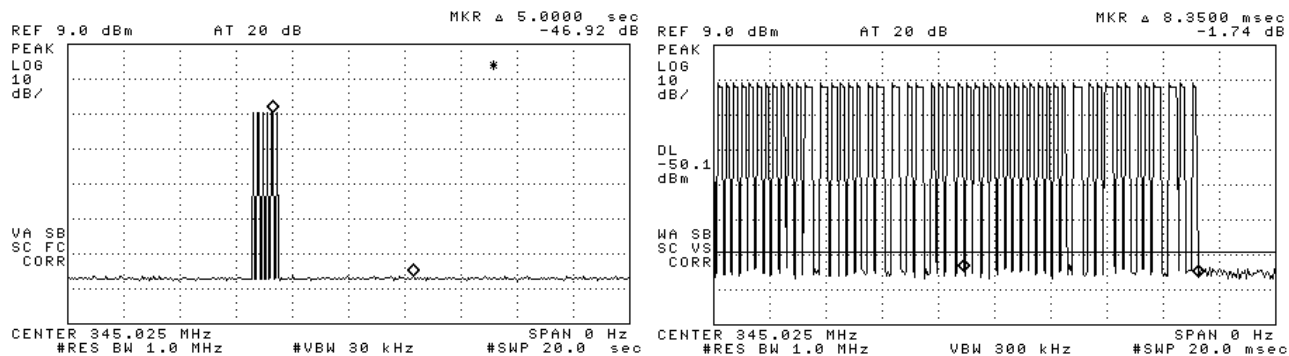


Figure 5(b): Pulsed Emission Characteristics (Duty Cycle).

3.2.2 Fundamental Emission Bandwidth

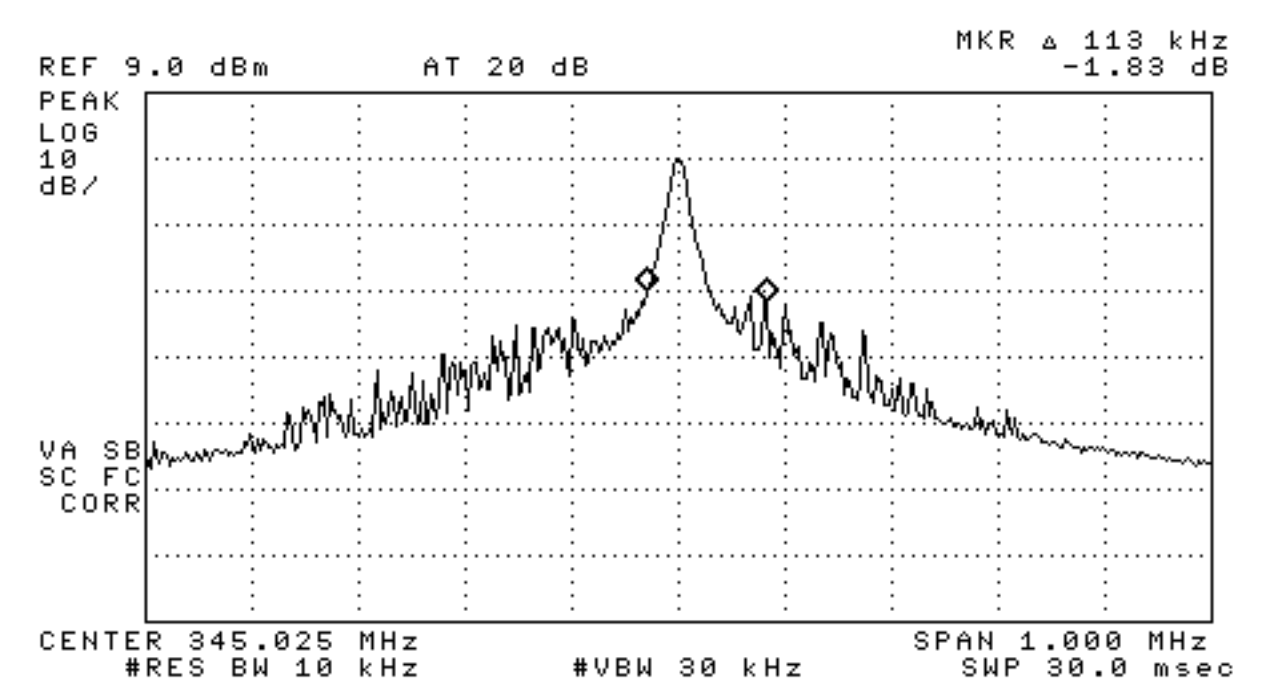


Figure 6: Intentional Emission Bandwidth.

Emission bandwidth (EBW) of the EUT is measured with the device placed in the test mode(s) with the shortest available frame length and minimum frame spacing. Radiated emissions are recorded following the test procedures listed in Section 1.1. The 20 dB EBW is measured as the max-held peak-detected signal when the IF bandwidth is greater than or equal to 1% of the receiver span. For complex modulations other than ASK and FSK, the 99% emission bandwidth per IC test procedures has a different result, and is also separately reported. The results of EBW testing are summarized in Table 4. Plots showing measurements employed to obtain the emission bandwidth reported are provided in Figure 6.

Table 4: Intentional Emission Bandwidth.

The emission bandwidth of the signal is shown in the following Figure. The allowed 99% bandwidth is 0.25% of 345 MHz, or 862.5 kHz.

3.2.3 Fundamental Emission

Following the test procedures listed in Section 1.1, radiated emissions measurements are made on the EUT for both Horizontal and Vertical polarized fields. Table 5 details the results of these measurements.

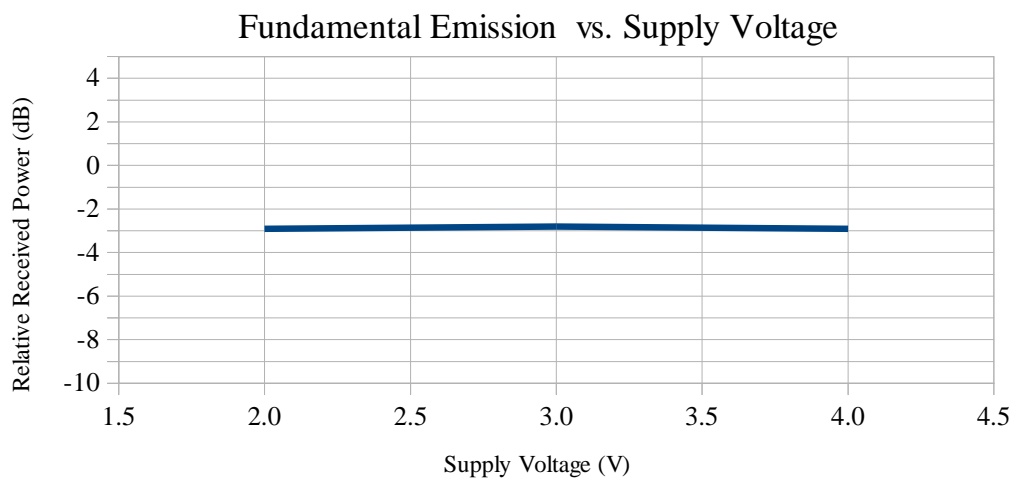

3.3 Unintentional Emissions

3.3.1 Transmit Chain Spurious Emissions

The results for the measurement of transmit chain spurious emissions at the nominal voltage and temperature are provided in Table 6. Measurements are performed to 10 times the highest fundamental operating frequency.
