

## RF Exposure Requirement

### 1.Limits

According to FCC 1.1310: The criteria listed in the following table shall be used to evaluate the environment impact of human exposure to radio frequency (RF) radiation as specified in 1.1307(b)

#### LIMITS FOR MAXIMUM PERMISSIBLE EXPOSURE (MPE)

(A) Limits for Occupational/ Control Exposures

(B) Limits for General Population/ Uncontrolled Exposures

F= Frequency in MHz

Friis Formula

Friis transmission formula:  $P_d = (P_{out} \cdot G) / (4 \cdot \pi \cdot r^2)$

Where

$P_d$  = power density in  $mW/cm^2$

$P_{out}$  = output power to antenna in mW

G = gain of antenna in linear scale

$\pi$  = 3.1416

r = distance between observation point and center of the radiator in cm

$P_d$  is the limit of MPE,  $1 mW/cm^2$ . If we know the maximum gain of the antenna and the total power input to the antenna, through the calculation, we will know the distance r where the MPE limit is reached.

### 2.Test Procedure

Software provided by client enabled the EUT to transmit and receive data at lowest, middle and highest channel individually.

The temperature and related humidity: 21°C and 55% RH.

### 3. Test Result of RF Exposure Evaluation

Maximum RF Power = 14.41 dBm= 27.61 mW

$$27.61/(4 \times 3.14 \times 400) = 0.00550$$

Frequency(MHz)	Maximum RF Power(mW)	Power Density at R = 20cm( $\text{mW}/\text{cm}^2$ )
2412	27.61	0.00550

Note:

The power density Pd (4th column) at a distance of 20 cm calculated from the Friis transmission formula is far below the limit of  $1 \text{ mW}/\text{cm}^2$ .
