Warming: Charge the handset for 16 hours before use.

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1. IMPORTANT SAFETY INSTRUCTIONS

When using your telephone equipment, basic safety precautions should always be followed to reduce the risk of fire, electric shock and injury, including the following:

- 1) Read and understand all the instructions.
- 2) Follow all warnings and instructions marked on the product.
- 3) Unplug this product from the wall outlet before cleaning. Do not use liquid cleaners or aerosol cleaners. Use a damp cloth for cleaning.
- Do not use this product near water such as near a bath tub, wash bowl, kitchen sink, laundry tub or swimming pool, or in a wet basement or shower.
- Do not place this product on an unstable table, shelf, stand or other unstable surfaces.
- 6) Avoid placing the telephone system in places with extreme temperature, direct sunlight, or other electrical devices. Protect your phone from moisture, dust, corrosive liquids and fumes.
- 7) Slots and openings in the back or bottom of the telephone base and handset are provided for ventilation. To protect them from overheating, these openings must not be blocked by placing the product on a soft surface such as a bed, sofa or rug. This product should never be placed near or over a radiator or heat register. This product should not be placed in any area where proper ventilation is not provided.
- 8) This product should be operated only from the type of power source indicated on the marking label. If you are not sure of the type of power supply in your home or office, consult your dealer or local power company.
- 9) Do not allow anything to rest on the power cord. Do not install this product where the cord may be walked on.
- 10) Never push objects of any kind into this product through the slots in the telephone base or handset because they may touch dangerous voltage points or create a short circuit. Never spill liquid of any kind on the product.

- 11) To reduce the risk of electric shock, do not disassemble this product, but take it to an authorized service facility. Opening or removing parts of the telephone base or handset other than specified access doors may expose you to dangerous voltages or other risks. Incorrect reassembling can cause electric shock when the product is subsequently used.
- 12) Do not overload wall outlets and extension cords.
- 13) Unplug this product from the wall outlet and refer servicing to an authorized service facility under the following conditions:
- When the power supply cord or plug is damaged or frayed.
- If liquid has been spilled onto the product.
- If the product has been exposed to rain or water.
- If the product does not operate normally by following the operating instructions. Adjust only those controls that are covered by the operation instructions. Improper adjustment of other controls may result in damage and often requires extensive work by an authorized technician to restore the product to normal operation.
- If the product has been dropped and the telephone base and/or handset has been damaged.
- If the product exhibits a distinct change in performance.
- 14) Avoid using a telephone (other than cordless) during an electrical storm. There is a remote risk of electric shock from lightning.
- 15) Do not use the telephone to report a gas leak in the vicinity of the leak. Under certain circumstances, a spark may be created when the adapter is plugged into the power outlet, or when the handset is replaced in its cradle. This is a common event associated with the closing of any electrical circuit. The user should not plug the phone into a power outlet, and should not put a charged handset into the cradle, if the phone is located in an environment containing concentrations of flammable or flame-supporting gases, unless there is adequate ventilation. A spark in such an environment could create a fire or explosion. Such environments might include: medical use of oxygen without adequate ventilation; industrial gases (cleaning solvents; gasoline vapors; etc.); a leak of natural gas; etc.
- 16) Only put the handset of your telephone next to your ear when it is in normal talk mode.
- 17) The power adapters are intended to be correctly oriented in a vertical or floor mount position. The prongs are not designed to hold the plug in place if it is plugged into a ceiling, under-the-table or cabinet outlet.

Precautions for users of implanted cardiac pacemakers

Cardiac pacemakers (applies only to digital cordless telephones): Wireless Technology Research, LLC (WTR), an independent research entity, led a multidisciplinary evaluation of the interference between portable wireless telephones and implanted cardiac pacemakers. Supported by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, WTR recommends to physicians that:

Pacemaker patients

- Should keep wireless telephones at least six inches from the pacemaker.
- Should NOT place wireless telephones directly over the pacemaker, such as in a breast pocket, when it is turned ON.
- Should use the wireless telephone at the ear opposite the pacemaker.

WTR's evaluation did not identify any risk to bystanders with pacemakers from other persons using wireless telephones.

About cordless telephones

 Privacy: The same features that make a cordless telephone convenient create some limitations. Telephone calls are transmitted between the telephone base and the cordless handset by radio waves, so there is a possibility that the cordless telephone conversations could be intercepted by radio receiving equipment within range of the cordless handset. For this reason, you should not think of cordless telephone conversations as being as private as those on corded telephones.

- Electrical power: The telephone base of this cordless telephone must be connected to a working electrical outlet. The electrical outlet should not be controlled by a wall switch. Calls cannot be made from the cordless handset if the telephone base is unplugged, switched off or if the electrical power is interrupted.
- Potential TV interference: Some cordless telephones operate at frequencies
 that may cause interference to televisions and VCRs. To minimize or
 prevent such interference, do not place the telephone base of the
 cordless telephone near or on top of a TV or VCR. If interference is
 experienced, moving the cordless telephone farther away from the TV
 or VCR often reduces or eliminates the interference.
- Rechargeable batteries: Exercise care in handling batteries in order not to create a short circuit with conducting material such as rings, bracelets and keys. The battery or conductor may overheat and cause harm. Observe proper polarity between the battery and the battery charger.
- Nickel-metal hydride rechargeable batteries: Dispose of these batteries in a safe manner. Do not burn or puncture the battery. Like other batteries of this type, if burned or punctured, they could release caustic material which could cause injury.



3. CONNECT

You can choose to connect the telephone base for desktop usage.

NOTES

- Use only the adapters provided.
- Make sure the electrical outlets are not controlled by wall switches.
- The adapters are intended to be correctly oriented in a vertical or floor mount position. The prongs are not designed to hold the plug in place if it is plugged into a ceiling, under-the-table or cabinet outlet.

TIP

- If you subscribe to digital subscriber line (DSL) high-speed Internet service through your telephone line, make sure you install a DSL filter (not included) between the telephone line cord and telephone wall jack. Contact your DSL service provider for more information.
- Plug one end of the telephone line cord into the telephone jack on base bottom. (Fig. A)
- Plug the small end of power adapter into a power jack on base bottom. (Fig. B)
- Plug the other end of the telephone line cord in to the telephone jack or DSL filter. (Fig. C)
- 4. Plug the large end of power adapter into a wall power outlet. (Fig. D)

- 5. Always use the cables provided in the box.
- 6. For HB2688-2, HB2688-3, HB2688-4, plug the power adaptor of the charger into a wall power outlet.




3.1. Installing and Charging the Batteries

- Battery already installed into handset, pull and remove the battery pull Tab to turn ON the handset. Show in the Fig. E.
- Put the handset on the base and charge for 15 hours before using the handset for the first time. The handset will give a beep when it is properly placed on the base or charger.

NOTES

- 1) Use only the battery provided.
- 2) Charge the battery provided with this product only in accordance with the instructions and limitations specified in this manual.




3.2. Replace battery

- 1. Slide down to open the battery compartment cover.
- 2. Place the 2 supplied rechargeable batteries as indicated. Pay extra attention to direction of polarity.
- 3. Slide the battery compartment cover back.
- 4. Put the handset on the base and charge for 15 hours before using the handset for the first time. The handset will give a beep when it is properly placed on the base or charger.


NOTES:

- 1) Use only the supplied NiMH rechargeable battery cells.
- 2) If the handset will not be used for a long time, disconnect and remove the Battery pack to prevent possible leakage.



3.3. Connecting the Base Station

- Plug one end of the telephone line cord into the telephone jack on base bottom.
- 2. Plug the small end of power adapter into a power jack on base bottom.
- 3. Plug the large end of power adapter into a wall power outlet.
- 4. Plug the other end of the telephone line cord into the telephone jack.
- 5. Always use the cables provided in the box.



3.4. Connecting the Charger(s) (for HB2688-2/HB2688-3/HB2688-4 models)

Plug the power adapter into a mains socket.



If you have a Broadband line

If you connect your telephone to a line with a broadband connection, you will need to insert a DSL filter between the telephone and the telephone line, otherwise you may get interference between the telephone and the broadband, which could cause problems.

In a fixed with broadband, every telephone must have a DSL filter connected, not just the one at the telephone point that your modem is connected to. If you need more broadband DSL filters, contact your broadband supplier.

4. BEFORE USE

4.1. Check for dial tone

Press . If you hear a dial tone, the installation is successful. If you do not hear a dial tone:

- Make sure the installation procedures described above are properly done.
- It may be a wiring problem. If you have changed your telephone service to digital service from a cable company or a VoIP service provider, the telephone line may need to be rewired to allow all existing telephone jacks to work. Contact your cable/VoIP service provider for more information.

4.2. Operating range

This cordless telephone operates with the maximum power allowed by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). Even so, this handset and telephone base can communicate over only a certain distance - which can vary with the locations of the telephone base and handset, the weather, and the layout of your home or office.

When the handset is out of range, the handset displays **Out of range**. If there is a call while the handset is out of range, it may not ring, or if it does ring, the call may not connect well when you press to the telephone base, and then press to answer the call. If the handset moves out of range during a telephone conversation, there may be interference. To improve reception, move closer to the telephone base.

5. CONFIGURE YOUR TELEPHONE

5.1. Using the handset menu

- 1. Press MRNII when the phone is not in use.
- 2. Press \mathbf{A} or $\mathbf{\nabla}$ until the screen displays the desired feature menu.
- 3. Press $\frac{OK}{MENUL}$ to enter that menu.

To return to the previous menu, press MUTE on the handset.

To return to idle mode, press and hold 2 on the handset.

5.2. Set language

The LCD language is preset to English. You can select English, French or Spanish to be used in all screen displays.

- 1. Press MRNII when the phone is not in use.
- 2. Press \triangle or ∇ to choose **HS SETTINGS**, and then press $\frac{\text{OK}}{\text{MENU}}$.
- 3. Press ♠ or ▼ to choose LANGUAGE, press OK MENU.

5.3. Set date and time

To set the correct time and date on the phone

- 1. Press $_{\text{MENIJ}}^{\text{DK}}$ when the handset is not in use.
- 2. Press \triangle or ∇ to choose **HS SETTINGS**, then press $\frac{OK}{MPNII}$.
- 3. Press ♠ or ▼ to choose DATE & TIME, then press OK
- 4. Press ♠ or ▼ to choose DATE FORMAT/TIME FORMAT/SET TIME.

5.3.1. Change Date/Time Format

- 1. Repeat Step 1 to 3 of Section 5.3.
- Press ^{□K}_{MENU} to choose **DATE FORMAT** to set desired date format between **MM-DD-YY** or **DD-MM-YY**. Press or to choose the selected format, then press MENU to confirm.
- 3. Press ♠ or ▼ to choose TIME FORMAT, then press ♣ choose desired time format between 12 HR or 24HR. Press ♠ or ▼ to choose the selected format, then press ♣ or ▼ to

5.3.2. Set the Time

- 1. Repeat Step 1 to 3 of Section 5.3.
- Press ♠ or ▼ to choose SET TIME.
- 3. Press OK MENU, then display shows **SET TIME**. Enter correct time, press OK MENU.
- 4. After setting time, display shows **SET DATE**. Enter correct date, press DK MBNU.

5.4. Dial mode

The dial mode is preset to touch-tone dialing. If you have pulse (rotary) service, you need to change the dial mode to pulse dialing before using the telephone to make a call.

- 1. Press OK when the handset is not in use.
- 2. Press \triangle or $\overleftarrow{\nabla}$ to choose **BS SETTINGS**, and then press $\underset{\text{MENU}}{\text{OK}}$

- 3. Press \triangle or ∇ to choose **DIAL MODE**, and then press $\frac{OK}{MPNJ}$.
- Press ♠ or ▼ to choose Tone or Pulse.
- Press ak to save your selection. Then the handset returns to the previous menu. You hear a confirmation tone.

5.5. Temporary tone dialing

If you have pulse (rotary) service only, you can switch from pulse to touch-tone dialing temporarily during a call. This is useful if you need to send touch-tone signals to access your telephone banking or long distance services.

- During a call, press ★.
- Use the dialing keys to enter the number. The telephone sends touch-tone signals. The telephone automatically returns to pulse dialing mode after you end the call.

6. TELEPHONE OPERATIONS

6.1. Make a Call

- 1. Press on the handset.
- 2. When you hear a dial tone, dial the number.

NOTES

The handset shows the elapsed time as you talk (in hours, minutes and seconds).

6.2. Predial a call

- 1. Enter the telephone number.
- 2. Press to dial.

NOTES

- The handset shows the elapsed time as you talk (in hours, minutes and seconds).
- While entering numbers, press MUTE to make corrections.

6.3. Answer a Call

Press (to answer.

6.4. End a Call

Press \boldsymbol{J} on the handset, or place the handset in the telephone base or handset charger.

6.5. Speakerphone

During a call, press to switch between the speakerphone and the handset earpiece. When the speakerphone is active, the handset displays if.

6.6. Volume

During a call, press \triangle or ∇ to adjust the listening volume.

NOTES

- The handset and speakerphone volume settings are independent.
- When the volume reaches the minimum or maximum setting, you hear two beeps.

6.7. Mute

The mute function allows you to hear the other party but the other party cannot hear you.

During a call:

Select **Mute** by pressing $_{\text{MUTE}}^{\text{C}}$ to mute the microphone and **Secrecy On** will display on the LCD. Your caller cannot hear you. Press **MUTE** to unmute the microphone.

6.8. Join a call in progress

You can use up to two system handsets at a time on an outside call.

- When a handset is already on a call, press (key on another handset to join the call.
- Press J or place the handset in the telephone base or handset charger to exit the call. The call continues until all handsets hang up.

When you subscribe to call waiting service with your telephone service provider, you hear an alert tone if there is an incoming call while you are on another call.

- Press and hold FLASH to put the current call on hold and take the new call.
- Press FLASH at any time to switch back and forth between calls.

 If you also subscribe to caller ID service, it will let you see the name a

If you also subscribe to caller ID service, it will let you see the name and telephone number of the caller during call waiting.

It may be necessary to change your telephone service to use this feature. Contact your telephone service provider if:

- You have both caller ID and call waiting, but as separate service (you may need to combine these service);
- You have only caller ID service, or only call waiting service; or
- You do not subscribe to caller ID or call waiting services.

There are fees for caller ID services. In addition, services may not be available in all areas.

6.9. Chain Dialing

Use this feature to initiate a dialing sequence from numbers stored in the phonebook while you are on a call.

Chain dialing can be useful if you wish to access other numbers (such as bank account numbers or access codes) from the phonebook.

6.9.1. To access a number from the phonebook while on a call:

- Press ^{□K}_{MENU}, then press ▼ to choose **PHONEBOOK**, press ^{□K}_{MENU} to confirm
- 2. Press \triangle or ∇ to scroll to the desired entry.
- 3. Press OK to dial the displayed number.

6.10. Temporary Ringer Silence

When the telephone is ringing, you can temporarily silence the handset ringer without disconnecting the call. The next call rings normally at the preset volume.

To silence the ringer:

Press J on the handset during ringing.

6.11. Redial List

Each handset stores the last 20 dialed numbers (up to 24 digits each) in the redial list and the last 50 incoming call numbers in incoming call list.

6.11.1. Review a redial list entry

- 1. Press REDIAL to enter the redial list.
- Press ♠ or ▼ to browse the list.
- Press to exit.

6.11.2. Dial a redial list entry

- 1. Press REDIAL to enter the redial list.
- 2. Press \triangle or ∇ to browse the list.
- 3. When the desired redial list entry display, press 👣 to dial the selected number.

6.11.3. Delete redial list entry

- 1. Press REDIAL to enter the redial list.
- 2. Press ♠ or ▼ to browse the list.

Press \prod_{MFNII}^{OK} then press A or ∇ to choose **DELETE**, press \prod_{MFNII}^{OK} to 3 confirm.

6.11.4. Delete all redial entry

- 1 Press REDIAL to enter the redial list
- Press A or ∇ to browse the list. 2.
- Press $\underset{MENII}{\text{OK}}$ then press \triangle or ∇ to choose **DELETE ALL**, press $\underset{MENII}{\text{OK}}$ to 3. confirm.

6.12. Multiple handset use

6.12.1. Intercom

This feature is only applicable where at least two registered handsets. You can register up to 4 handsets to the telephone base.

To make an internal call:

- ake an Internal Call:

 If you have only two handsets, press MUTE.

- If you have more than two handsets, press $_{\rm MUTE}^{\rm L}/$ ${\bf A}$ or ${\bf \nabla}$ to select the handset number then press $_{\rm MENU}^{\rm OK}$.
- To ring all handsets to intercom, press $\underset{MIJTF}{\square}$ / $\stackrel{\square}{A}$ or $\stackrel{\square}{\nabla}$ to select CALL ALL then press OK

Transfer a call or make a three-party conference call:

You can transfer an external call to another handset registered to the base, or set up 3-way conference call between 2 internal handsets and 1 external caller.

- During a call, press $_{MPNII}^{\square K}$.
- Select $\bf INTERCOM$, press $^{\Pi K}_{MENU}$ / ${ \bf A}$ or ${ \bf \nabla}$ to select handset number and then press $^{\Pi K}_{MENU}$.
- Press **U** on the called handset to answer.
- Long press * on the calling hanset to establish conference call.

6.13. Find the Handset

You can locate the handset by pressing on the bottom of base station. The handset registered to the base will produce the paging tone and "PAGING" is displayed on the LCD.

You can stop the paging by pressing ${m J}$, or any dialing keys on any handset or on the base again.

Note: If there is an incoming call during paging, the phone will ring with the incoming call instead of paging.

7. CONTACTS (PHONEBOOK)

You can store up to 100 entries in your list of contacts.

Contact entries will automatically be copied to any other handsets you have registered to the base. Any change made on one handset will be updated on all other handsets.

7.1. Add a phonebook entry

- 1. In idle mode, press 11 to choose PHONEBOOK.
- Press OK which twice to select ADD.
- 3. Enter the name of the contact and press □K MENU, enter the number of the contact and press □K MENU again to save as VIP (If you save the contact as VIP, it shows "!" on the right hand side of the name of the contact to indicate that it is VIP contact, while you view the contact) or MUTE to save as contact, press ♠ or ▼ to select the melody and press □K MENU.

NOTE: To save a number from Blocklist into Phonebook, it is not allowed and shows **DOUBLE NUM**. If you decide to delete a number from Blocklist and then save the number into Phonebook, please refer to Section 11.1.4. to delete the number from Blocklist firstly.

To save a existing name into Phonebook, it is not allowed and shows **NAME EXISTED**. Use a new name to save the entry.

7.2. Edit a phonebook entry

- 1. In idle mode, press to open your contact list.
- 2. Press \triangle or ∇ to scroll to the entry you want to edit and press $\frac{DK}{MENU}$.
- 3. Press ∇ to highlight **EDIT** and press $\frac{OK}{MBNU}$.
- 4. Edit the name by pressing $oldsymbol{\Lambda}$ or $oldsymbol{\overline{\nabla}}$ to move cursor left or right.
- Press ^C_{MUTE} to delete characters and use the keypad to enter new ones.
- 5. Press OK any of the numbers you have stored.
- Press

 C

 MITF

 to delete digits and re-enter any new ones.
- Press OK MENU to confirm. Repeat Step 3 of Section 7.1 to choose VIP and Melody ringer.

7.3. Delete a phonebook entry

- In idle mode, press to open your contact list.
- 2. Press \triangle or ∇ to select the contact and pressing $\frac{OK}{MENU}$.
- 3. Press ∇ to choose **DELETE** and press $\frac{OK}{MENIU}$.

7.4. View/Dial a contact

- In idle mode, press to open your contact list.
- 2. Press \triangle or ∇ to scroll through and view the entries.
- 3. To dial an entry, press 📜 .

8. SPEED DIAL

8.1. To register the direct memories in keys M1, M2, 1, 2 & 3

- 1. Press $\stackrel{\square K}{\text{MENU}}$, then press \bigwedge or \bigvee to select **HS SETTINGS**, press $\stackrel{\square K}{\text{MENU}}$, \bigwedge or \bigvee to select **DIRECT MEM**.
- 2. Press $_{\text{MENU}}^{\text{OK}}$, then press \triangle or ∇ to select M1 or M2, 1, 2 or 3.
- 3. Press $_{\text{MENU}}^{\text{DK}}$, edit or enter the number, press $_{\text{MENU}}^{\text{DK}}$. (For M1 or M2, edit or enter the name and number, choose VIP and Melody same as phone book entry).

9. PHONE SETTINGS

9.1. Handset Settings

9.1.1. Set Ringer melody and volume

- 1. Press $\frac{OK}{MENII}$ and \mathbf{A} or $\mathbf{\nabla}$ to select **HS SETTINGS**.
- 2. Press $_{MENU}^{OK}$ and \triangle or ∇ to select **RING SETUP**.
- 3. Press $_{MENU}^{OK}$ and \triangle or ∇ to select **RING VOLUME**.
- Press ^{OK}_{MENU} and ♠ or ▼ to select the desired ringer volume. There are 6 ringer volume levels including RINGER OFF.
- 5. Press OK to confirm.

9.1.2. Turn the handset tones on or off

- 1. Press $\underset{MENLI}{OK}$ and \triangle or ∇ to select **HS SETTINGS**.
- 2. Press $\overline{\mathbf{v}}$ to select **TONE SETUP** and then press $\frac{\mathbf{OK}}{\mathbf{MENU}}$.
- Press ▼ to select KEY TONE, then press ♠ or ▼ to select ON or OFF for KEY TONE, press OK MENU to confirm.

9.1.3. Rename the Handset

- Press OK MENU, press ♠ or ▼ to select HS SETTINGS, and then press OK MENU.
- Press to select RENAME HS and then press OK MENU.
- 3. Edit the name by selecting $\frac{C}{\text{MUTE}}$ to delete the characters, then enter the new name, and then press $\frac{C}{\text{MENU}}$ to confirm.

10. CALLER ID (NETWORK DEPENDENT)

This feature is available if you have subscribed the caller ID service with your telephone service provider.

If your caller's name is stored in your contacts list and it matches the number calling, you'll see the caller's name and where they are calling from on the display instead.

If you receive a call from a number you have stored in your Blocked calls list, **BLOCKED CALL** will be displayed with the number. (In the Call Blocker ON Status)

The caller ID log can store up to 50 incoming (missed and answered) calls. If you haven't subscribed to a caller ID service, no number will be displayed in the caller ID log for incoming calls but the time and date will be recorded. Caller ID are listed in chronological order with the most recently received/made call at the top of the caller ID log.

When the caller ID log is full and a new call is received/made, the oldest entry will be deleted automatically. The caller ID log can hold numbers up to 24 digits and names up to 12 characters.

Missed call notification


If an incoming call has been missed (i.e. not answered), the missed call icon will be displayed on the idle screen with the number of missed calls displayed, e.g. $^{\bullet}$. You can clear the notification by viewing the calls list on any handset registered to the base.

10.1. View and dial out in the caller ID log

- Long press to CID. The most recent entry is at the top of the list will be displayed.
- 2. Press \triangle or ∇ to scroll through and view the list.
- 3. When the entry you want is highlighted, press \textstyle{\textstyle{1}}\text{ to dial.}

10.2. View dialing options

Although the caller ID log entries received have 10 digits (the area code plus the seven-digit number), in some areas, you may dial a 1 plus the seven digits, or a 1 plus the area code plus the seven digits. You can change the number of digits that you dial from or store to the phonebook. While reviewing the caller ID log, press * key repeatedly to display different dialing options for local and long distance numbers before dialing or saving the telephone number in the phonebook.



10.3. Save a caller ID log entry to your phonebook

- Long press to the most recent entry is at the top of the list will be displayed.
- 2. Press \triangle or ∇ to choose the entry you want and press $\frac{OK}{MENU}$.
- 3. Press \triangle or ∇ to choose **ADD TO PB**, press $\frac{OK}{MPNII}$.

4. View and edit the name, then press $^{\square K}_{MENU}$. View and edit the number and press $^{\square K}_{MENU}$. Choose **VIP** and **MELODY RINGER**, then press $^{\square K}_{MENU}$.

NOTE: To save a number from Blocklist into Phonebook, it is not allowed and shows **DOUBLE NUM**. If you decide to delete a number from Blocklist and then save the number into Phonebook, please refer to Section 11.1.4. to delete the number from Blocklist firstly.

To save a existing name into Phonebook, it is not allowed and shows **NAME EXISTED**. Use a new name to save the entry.

10.4. Delete an entry or the entire caller ID log

- 1. Long press ##, then if you want to delete just one entry.
- Press ♠ or ▼ to to choose the entry and press OK MENU.
 Press ▼ to choose DELETE, then press OR MENU to confirm.
- 3. If you want to delete the entire caller ID log, long press $\underset{\text{CID}}{\rightleftharpoons}$, press $\underset{\text{MBNII}}{\bowtie}$, then press $\overrightarrow{\nabla}$ to choose **DELETE ALL**, then press $\underset{\text{MBNII}}{\bowtie}$ to confirm.

CALL BLOCK

This telephone is built-in with Smart Call Block feature*. This feature will help you avoid nuisance calls by only allowing some numbers to make your phone ring. Default setting Smart Call Block in this telephone if OFF but you can enable it via your phone settings.

*This feature requires a subcription of Caller Line Identification service from your network service provider. Charges may apply.

Follow below table to chose the Call Block mode you prefer

Setting	Expectation
OFF	Call Block function is Disabled. This is the default mode.
ON	Call Block function is set to Manual. Numbers registered in the block list (up to 100 numbers) will not go through and the phone will ring silently. Numbers can be added to the list while the phone is ringing and / or after a call.
CONTACTS	In this automatic mode, any number not registered in your phonebook will automatically be blocked and not cause your phone to ring. All calls from contacts registered in your phonebook will proceed normally. When this mode is chosen, Contacts OK is displayed on LCD in idle mode unless you have missed call.

11.1. Manual call block mode: ON

When you chose **ON** in the call block settings, all calling numbers registered in your blocklist will be blocked.

How to block an incoming call:

When the phone is ringing and before answering, press will terminate the call and offer you the option to register the number to the blocklist in one click .Then to confirm the registration of this number in the blacklist, press DK

IMPORTANT: if you don't confirm, the number will not be added to the blocklist and the next call will go through normally.

11.1.1. Enable MANUAL mode

In idle mode, press **7** to access **BLOCK SET**.

Press $_{\text{MENU}}^{\text{OK}}$ and press \triangle or \bigcirc to select \bigcirc N. Press $_{\text{MENU}}^{\text{OK}}$

NOTE: To save a number from Phonebook into Blocklist, it is not allowed and shows **BLOCK DENIED**. If you decide to delete a number from Phonebook and then save the number into Blocklist, please refer to Section 7.3. to delete the number from Phonebook firstly.

From incoming call numbers list,

- Press and hold CID to access the call list.
- Press ♠ or ▼ to select a number.
- Press $_{MBNU}^{OK}$, press \triangle or ∇ to select **ADD** to **BLIST**.
- Press OK to show selected number, press OK to save to Blocklist.

Delete all numbers from blocklist

- Press $\underset{\text{MENU}}{\text{OK}}$, press \bigwedge or \bigvee to select **DELETE ALL**, press $\underset{\text{MENU}}{\text{OK}}$, **CONFIRM?** is shown, and then press $\underset{\text{MENU}}{\text{OK}}$ to confirm.

11.2. Automatic call block mode

11.2.1. Contacts only

Only calls from contacts registered in your phonebook (normal and VIP) will go through and make your phone ring. To activate this mode:

Press **7** to access **Block set**.

Press $^{OK}_{MENU}$, press $lack \Delta$ or $lack lack ag{T}$ to select **CONTACTS OK**. Press $^{OK}_{MENU}$ to validate.

11.2.2. VIPs only

In this restrictive mode, only calls from numbers registered as VIP in your phonebook will go through and make your phone ring.

Press of to access Block set.

Press $\prod_{M=N+1}^{OK}$, press $\prod_{M=N+1}^{OK}$ or \bigvee to select **VIP OK**. Press $\prod_{M=N+1}^{OK}$ to validate.

11.3. Anonymous call block mode

This feature allows you to block numbers that do not display a number on your phone. It can be enabled or disabled independently from the previous call block modes.

- Press ♠ or ▼ to select BLOCK ANONYM, then press MENU.
- Press f A or $f \nabla$ to select one of the options: PRIVATE / ALL / OFF.
- Press ^{OK}_{MENII} to validate.

PRIVATE: This mode will block incoming calls that have purposely kept their numbers private from you.

ALL: This mode will block all incoming calls, including private calls, international calls, pay phone and other out-of-area calls.

12.7. Direct Mem

Refer to section 8.

12.8. Alarm Settings

Set an alarm clock on this phone. When an alarm is set, \bigcap shows on display. When the alarm time is reached, the phone rings with the alarm melody for 2 minutes, and, the \bigcap and "ALARM ON" on display the alarm will alert again at then end of snooze period of 4 minutes. Press and hold \nearrow to stop the SNOOZE.

To de-registered a handset from the Base, 4-digit PIN need to be enterd. Repeat Step 1 to 3 of Section 13 to select **DELETE HS**, press $_{\text{MENU}}^{\text{OK}}$, then enter 4-digit system PIN, press $_{\text{MENU}}^{\text{OK}}$.

13.6. Home area code

The phone can be store the home area code for CID view dialing option.

- Repeat Step 1 to 3 of Section 13 to select AREA CODE, press MENU.
- Edit or enter home area code, then press ^{OK}_{MENU} to confirm.

14. REGISTRATION

The phone can be registered up to FIVE handsets to a single base station. The handset is not registered to the base station, **REGISTER** is shown on display.

To register new handset:

- Press and hold on the base station for about 8 seconds, the base station is entered into registration mode.
- Press $_{\text{MENU}}^{\text{OK}}$ to enter menu, then $oldsymbol{\Delta}$ or $oldsymbol{\nabla}$ to select **REGISTRATION**.

REGISTRATION, press $_{\text{MENL}}^{\text{OK}}$ and 4-digist system PIN code need to enter, then press $_{\text{MENL}}^{\text{OK}}$ to confirm.

If the handset registration is successful, a confirmation tone will be heard. The handset will be assigned automatically to the next available handset number. Handset number shows in the handset display during standby mode.

15. RESET THE PHONE

The phone can be reset to the factory settings. After reset, all the settings and caller ID log entries inside the phone will be deleted, except **PHONEBOOK** remains unchanged.

If we replace the Product, we may use new or refurbished replacement parts. If we choose to replace the Product, we may replace it with a new or refurbished Product of the same or similar design. We will retain defective parts, modules, or equipment. Replacement of the Product, at HelloBaby's option, is your exclusive remedy. HelloBaby will return the replacement Products to you in working condition. You should expect the replacement to take approximately 30 days.

How long is the limited warranty period?

The limited warranty period for the Product extends for ONE (1) YEAR from the date of purchase. If HelloBaby replaces a Materially Defective Product under the terms of this limited warranty, this limited warranty also applies to the replacement Product for a period of either (a) 90 days from the date the replacement Product is shipped to you or (b) the time remaining on the original one-year warranty; whichever is longer.

What is not covered by this limited warranty?

20. SAFETY
