



# Set up & go

Create or log into a MOTOBLUR account to get your contacts, email, messages, and status information, for all your accounts, all in one place, all the time. There's more in "Your MOTOBLUR account" on page 10. Registration is secure, and should only take a few minutes.

**Note:** Before you use MOTOBLUR, read the terms and conditions during registration and if you agree, touch **Agree**.

1 Turn on.



- 2 Select a language.
- 3 Register or log in.

Tip: Open your phone to type.



If you have not created a MOTOBLUR account, you'll need to register: Enter your name, your current email address (where MOTOBLUR can send account information), and a new MOTOBLUR account password.

**Tip:** You can also skip MOTOBLUR setup by tapping **Setup account later**.

4 Add your accounts to MOTORILIR



5 Import your SIM contacts.

To add an account, touch it. Then, enter the user name or email and password that you set up on that account.

**Tip:** For more, or to add accounts anytime, go to "Add account" on page 11.

After you sign in, your phone will automatically start to import your SIM contacts.

**Note:** This phone supports data-intensive apps and services. It is strongly recommended that you purchase a data plan that meets your needs. Contact your service provider for details.

### Turn it on & off

To turn on your phone, press and hold Power ① (on the right side of the phone).

To turn off your phone, press and hold Power **①**, then touch **Power off**.

#### Wi-Fi™ connect

If you want to use a Wi-Fi computer network for even faster Internet access, touch Menu 📆 > Settings > Wireless & networks > Wi-Fi settings.

#### Cool content & more

Browse and download thousands of the coolest apps on the planet from Android Market<sup>TM</sup> (see "Apps for all" on page 29).

**Note:** Some features are not available in some areas or with some service providers.

Your phone comes with a microSD memory card installed—you can load it up with photos, videos, and music from your computer using "USB drag & drop" on page 43.

### Security

Your contacts are backed-up on MOTOBLUR, so don't worry. Even if you lose your phone, MOTOBLUR can help you find it or wipe it. And when you get your next MOTOBLUR product, your stored info makes it a snap to set up with just a username and password.

Of course it doesn't stop there. There are plenty of ways to protect your phone and your information, in "Security" on page 48.

# Touchscreen & keys

a few essentials

### Touch tips

Here are some tips on how to navigate around your phone.

#### Touch

To choose an icon or option, touch it



#### Touch & hold

To open special options, touch and hold an icon or other item. Try it: In the home screen, touch


Contacts, then touch and hold a contact to open options.



#### Drag

To scroll through a list or move slowly, *drag* across the touchscreen. Try it: In the home screen, touch

Contacts, then drag your Contacts list up or down



Tip: When you drag or

flick a list, a *scroll bar* appears on the right. Drag the scroll bar to move the list to a letter A - Z.

#### Flick

To scroll through a list or move quickly, *flick* across the touchscreen (drag quickly and release).

**Tip:** When you flick a long list, touch the screen to stop it from scrolling.

#### Pinch-to-zoom

Get a closer look at maps, web pages, or photos. To zoom in, *touch* the screen with two fingers and then slide them apart. To zoom out, *drag* your fingers together.

# Key tips

#### Menu, home, & back

Touch Home (a) to close any menu or app and return to the home screen.

In the home screen, touch and hold Home at to show the last few apps you used, then touch an app to open it.

Press Search Q for text search.

Touch Menu 📳 to open menu options, or touch Back 🕥 to go back.

### Sleep & wake up

To save your battery, prevent accidental touches, or when you want to wipe smudges off your touchscreen, put the touchscreen to sleep by pressing Power ①. To wake up the touchscreen, just press Power ② again, or open the phone.

To change how long your phone waits before the screen goes to sleep automatically, touch Menu Settings > Sound & display > Screen timeout.

**Tip:** To make the screen lock when it goes to sleep, use "Screen lock" on page 48.

#### Power key menu

Press and hold Power ① to open the power key menu, where you can turn off the phone (**Power off**), or turn **Airplane mode** or **Silent mode** on or off.

### Adjust volume

Press the volume keys to change the ring volume (in the home screen), or the earpiece volume (during a call).

Tip: To silence the ringtone with a double tap, or to switch to vibrate mode by placing your phone face down, touch Menu 🔠 > Settings > Sounds & display > Double-Tap to Silence or Smart Profile: Face Down to Vibrate.

# Spin the screen

The touchscreen can rotate 90 degrees in some apps, such as messaging and contacts, to stay right-side up when you rotate your phone:

Find it: Menu 😁 > Settings > Sound & display > Orientation

### Home screen

quick access to the things you need most

#### Quick start: Home screen

The home screen gives you all your latest information in one place. It's what you see when you turn on the phone or touch Home from a menu. It's basically like this:



Note: Your home screen might look a little different.

# Use & change your home screen

On your home screen, *shortcuts* are icons that you open your favorite apps, Web bookmarks, contacts,

mail labels, or music playlists. Widgets show you news, weather, messages, and other updates.

Flick the home screen left or right to open other *panels* of shortcuts and widgets.

- To open something, touch it. Touch Home **a** to return to the home screen.
- To change a widget's settings, open it and then touch Menu (♣) > Settings.

You can find details about the settings for Happenings ("Add account" on page 11), Messages ("Set up messaging" on page 20), Music ("Music" on page 39), Social Status ("Update your status" on page 10), or News or Weather ("Widgets" on page 35).

 To add something or change your wallpaper, touch and hold an empty spot until you see the Add to Home screen menu.

You can add a folder to organize your shortcuts.

 To move or delete something, touch and hold it until you feel a vibration, then drag it to another spot, another panel, or the trash on the lower right of the screen.

### Running multiple apps

No need to close an app before opening another one. Your phone runs multiple apps, all at once.

You can open a new app while already running another. Touch Home (a) to return to the home screen. Open the Applications tab and touch the app you want. To switch from one running app to another, touch and hold Home (a) to see what apps are already open, then touch the one you want. You can view up to the last six apps that you ran.

### Search

To search, touch Search  $\bigcirc$  on the front of the phone, or press Search  $\bigcirc$  on the QWERTY keypad.



### Phone status & notifications

At the top of the screen, icons on the left notify you about new messages or events (flick the bar down for details). Icons on the right tell you about phone status:

### Main menu

# Quick start: Main menu

The main menu shows you all of your applications. To open it from the home screen, touch **()**. To close it, touch Home **()**.

Note: Your main menu will vary.

**Tip:** To find an app in the main menu, open your phone (or touch and hold Menu 📳 to open a display keypad), then type the app name.

#### Recent apps

Touch and hold Home  $\widehat{\mbox{\ \ a}}$  to see the last few apps you used, then touch the app you want. Touch Home  $\widehat{\mbox{\ \ a}}$  to return to the home screen.

#### Your MOTOBLUR account

The first time you turned on your phone, you registered for a MOTOBLUR account that manages your messages, contacts, and more ("Set up & go" on page 4). You can log into this account from a computer to upload contacts, reset your password, get help, or even locate your phone:

### What is MOTOBLUR?

MOTOROLA **FLIPOUT** with MOTOBLUR is a phone with social skills.

MOTOBLUR is the only service that can sync all your friends, emails, messages, Facebook™, MySpace, Twitter and happenings with continuous updates and back-ups, along with the ability to remotely locate and wipe your phone if its lost or stolen.

# Update your status

After you add a social networking account, you can update and see your current status in a **Social Status** widget on your home screen.

To update your status, just touch your **Social Status** widget and enter text. If you have more than one

account, you can use the pull-down menu to limit which accounts are updated. If you don't see a **Social Status** widget, flick your home screen left or right to check all panels.

To add a **Social Status** widget:

- 1 Touch and hold an empty spot on your home screen to open the **Add to Home screen** menu.
- 2 Touch Motorola widgets > Social Status. The widget appears in the empty spot, and will show your status the next time your phone updates from the network.

### Add account

If you skipped setting up a MOTOBLUR account when you first turned on your phone, you'll need to set up a MOTOBLUR account before you can add other accounts. In your home screen, touch **Set up Your Blur account** and follow the steps in "Set up & go" on page 4.

Note: You can add your Facebook, MySpace, Twitter, or other accounts to your phone. If you don't have accounts, you can visit their Web sites to set them up.

Find it: Menu > Settings > Accounts > Add account

To sign into your account, use the user name or email and password that you set up on that account (the same as on your computer).

When you sign into social networking accounts, you'll see your friends and contacts in your **Contacts** list, and your status and updates can appear in **Social Status** and **Happenings** widgets.

Note: Twitter and MySpace messages will always appear as "read" on your phone, but your phone notifies you when you receive a new message. MySpace marks your messages as "read" online.

For email accounts, see "Set up messaging" on page 20.

Tip: To download updates faster, use "Wi-Fitm" on page 31.

# View account updates & features

After you add a social networking account, you can see and respond to friends' updates with the **Happenings** widget on your home screen. If you don't see one, set one up in "Widgets" on page 35.

When you touch the **Happenings** widget to open an update, you can touch **(a)** to open its Web site.

Note: Your network or other factors might affect the speed of widget updates.

#### Edit & delete accounts

# Find it: Menu 😬 > Settings > Accounts


Touch and hold an account, then touch **Open account** to edit it, or touch **Remove account** to remove it (along with its contacts and messages).

### **Calls**

Dialing options



#### In-call options



Turn Bluetooth on or off.

During a call, touch Menu 📆 to choose **Hold**, **New call**, **Use Bluetooth**, or **Voice Quality**. Your touchscreen goes dark to avoid accidental touches. To wake it up, press Power 💽.

Tip: You can touch Home (a) or Back (5) to hide the active call display. To reopen it, touch ( Dialer.

### Make & answer calls

**Note:** Unless you have a headset connected, you need to open the phone to make and answer calls.

To make a call, open the phone, touch coller, enter a number, then touch Call.

To answer a call, open the phone or drag **Answer** to the right (when your phone is unlocked, **Answer** is just a touch button).



#### End calls

Touch **End call**.



### Voicemail

# Speed dial

- To call a number, touch it.
- To add, edit, or clear entries, touch Menu <a>!</a>

# Frequent calls

Find it: C Dialer > Menu 🔛 > Frequent

· To call a number, touch it.

 To send a text message, view a contact, add the call to speed dial, or other options, touch and hold an entry.

#### Handsfree

**Note:** Using a mobile device or accessory while driving may cause distraction and may be illegal. Always obey the laws and drive safely.

During a call:

- To use the speakerphone, touch Speaker.
- To use a Bluetooth<sup>™</sup> device, touch Bluetooth.

### Voice commands

Find it: Voice commands, and then say a command.

#### Mute & hold

During a call:

- · To mute the current call, touch Mute.
- To put a call on hold, touch Menu > Hold.

# Enter numbers during a call

To enter numbers during a call, touch  $\blacksquare$  and then touch the dial pad.

#### Conference calls

To start a conference call, call the first number. After they answer, touch Menu 🔐 > **New call** and call the next number. When the next number answers, touch Menu 🔠 > **Join**.

### Your phone number

Find it: Menu 📆 > Settings > About phone > Status > My phone number

#### Your caller ID

To hide your number from the people you call, touch Menu 📆 > Settings > Call settings > Additional settings > Caller ID.

# Emergency calls

Note: Your service provider programs one or more emergency phone numbers (such as 911 or 112) that you can call under any circumstances, even when your phone is locked. Emergency numbers vary by country. Your pre-programmed emergency number(s) may not work in all locations, and sometimes an emergency call cannot be placed due to network, environmental, or interference issues.

- 2 Enter the emergency number.
- 3 Touch Call to call the emergency number.

**Note:** Your mobile device can use AGPS satellite signals to help emergency services find you (see "GPS & AGPS" on page 53).

### Call forwarding & waiting

You can forward calls all the time or only when your phone is busy, unanswered, or unreachable (not on the network):

Find it: Menu 😁 > Settings > Call settings > Call forwarding

When you're on a call and a second call comes in, **Call waiting** lets you answer it by touching **Answer**. You can turn off **Call waiting** to send second calls straight to your voicemail:

Find it: Menu > Settings > Call settings > Additional settings > Call waiting

# Restrict outgoing calls

To restrict your phone so that it can only dial a few numbers:

Find it: Menu 📆 > Settings > Call settings > Fixed dialing number

To turn fixed dialing on, touch FDN disabled.


 To add or delete the allowed numbers, touch Manage FDN list.

# Quick start: Contacts

Find it: L Contacts



**Tip:** To search the list, touch and hold Menu 📳 > **Search**, then type a name. When you flick or drag this list, a scroll bar appears on the right. Drag the scroll bar to move the list faster.

# Import contacts from your SIM

Note: You might have already done this during "Set up & go" on page 4.

### Call, text, or email contacts

### Find it: L Contacts

For View contact, Send email, Delete contact, touch and hold the contact.

#### View & use contacts

With a MOTOROLA **FLIPOUT** with MOTOBLUR, you'll know what everybody's up to and when. Every time you pick up a call, check a message, or look up a friend's contact info, sure, you'll see their name and number, but you'll see their social network status and smiling face, too.

### Find it: L Contacts

 To filter the contacts by group (All, Facebook, and so on) touch Menu B > Display group.

Tip: To change which account provides the pictures for your **Contacts**, from the home screen touch Menu ( ) > Settings > Accounts > Menu ( ) > Picture source.

- To find a contact, just type the name.
  - Touch a contact to open their details. To start a call or message, just touch their phone number or other info
- To change the list view to History (recently used),
   A-Z (list without status), or Status (list with status),
   flick the screen to the left or right.

#### Edit or delete contacts

### Find it: L Contacts

Touch the contact, then touch Menu 📳 > **Edit** or **Delete**. You can set a ringer, address, and other details that will be saved on your phone and your MOTOBLUR account.

Where are contacts edited or deleted? Your phone edits the contacts in its memory, and also updates your MOTOBLUR account. Your changes won't affect your SIM card.

#### Link contacts

You might have two **Contacts** for the same person, maybe a Facebook friend who is also stored on your SIM card, or one friend with two email addresses. To combine these two contacts:

Find it: L Contacts

Touch a contact to open it, then touch Menu 📳 > Link contact and touch the second entry. Your MOTOBLUR account remembers this connection.

#### Create contacts

Find it: Contacts > Menu > Add contact

Open your phone to type the name and details.



To see more details, flick up.

When you're finished, touch Save.

Where are contacts saved? Your phone saves new contacts in its memory, your MOTOBLUR account, and other accounts you select: In Contacts, touch Menu [ ] > Settings to choose which accounts get updated. New contacts won't be on your SIM card, but they will download to any new MOTOBLUR phone when you log into your MOTOBLUR account.

# Synchronize contacts

**Note:** You might not have this feature. For details, ask your service provider. To synchronize contacts in your service provider account, ask your service provider.

When you change one of your **Contacts**, your phone automatically updates your MOTOBLUR account online. Also, your phone updates your **Contacts** and MOTOBLUR account whenever you change a friend in your social networking accounts.

So, you don't have to do anything to synchronize your **Contacts** with your other accounts! MOTOBLUR takes care of it for you.

# My details

Find it: Contacts > Menu > My info
To edit details, touch them.

### Groups

You can put your **Contacts** into groups that you create (like "friends," "family," or "work"). Then, you can find contacts faster by showing one group at a time.

To create a group in your **Contacts**, touch Menu 🔡 > **Display group** > **Create new group**. Enter a group name, then touch **Add** to add members. When you're finished, touch **Done**.


To show only one group in your **Contacts**, touch **Contacts** at the top of your screen and choose the group name.

# Messaging

sometimes it's best to text, or IM, or email . . .

# Quick start: Messaging

Find it: Home > > Messaging > Universal Inbox



Touch to select multiple messages to move, delete, and more. Or, touch Menu R > Select all or Deselect all.

Tip: To see more messages, flick or drag up.

# Read & reply to messages

Every text, email, friend-feed, wall post, and bulletin is automatically delivered to you, ready for your immediate reply with the flip-open keypad. The best part is you don't have to dig through any apps, screens or menus—every message streams right to the phone, viewable exactly the way you want.

Note: Universal Inbox shows all of your messages together—text, email, and social networking messages. To show only one type of message, touch a message account type instead of Universal Inbox.

- · To open a message and all of its replies, touch it.
- To respond to a message, just open it and enter your response in the text box at the bottom.
- To open options, touch and hold a message.

**Tip:** Add the **Messages** widget to your homescreen, see "Widgets" on page 35.

### Create messages

Find it: Home ♠ > ♠ > ► Messaging > ♣ > Compose

Choose a message type. Then, enter the recipient and message. In text messages and emails, touch Menu [1] to add files or choose other options.

### Send & receive attachments

To send a file in a message, open a new message, touch Menu 📳, and choose the file.

When you receive a message with an attachment. open the message and touch the file name to download it. Then, touch the name again to open it. Some file formats can be converted to HTML for faster. viewing, and your phone will show a button that says Get HTML version.

Tip: To send and receive large attachments faster, use a Wi-Fi connection, in "Wi-Fi™" on page 31.

# Set up messaging

To add email accounts, in the home screen touch Menu 📳 > Settings > Accounts > Add account

- Corporate Sync is for Exchange server work email accounts. Enter details from your IT administrator.
  - Tip: You might need to enter your domain name with your user name (like domain/username)
  - Note: Some work accounts might require you to add a password lock to your phone, for security. To stop an account from showing the contacts you create on your phone, touch L Contacts. touch Menu 🔡 > **Settings**, then uncheck the account under New contacts
- **Email** is for most personal email accounts. For account details, contact the account provider.

To change your settings, touch Home  $\bigcirc$  >  $\bigcirc$  > Messaging > Menu 🔡 , then touch:

- Manage accounts to change your user name or password (or server settings, for email).
- Edit Universal Inhox to choose which accounts show messages in the Universal Inbox.
- Messaging Settings to set the notification for each account type (along with other preferences, for email)

To get Gmail™ in your Messages widget and Universal Inbox, you'll need to add it as an Email account: Touch Home (a) > (a) > (b) Messaging > Menu 📳, then touch Manage accounts > Add account > Email and enter your Gmail™ details. If you added your Google account too, turn off its email sync to avoid duplicate email notices: Touch ( > **Accounts**, touch your Google™ account, and touch the checkmark to turn off Gmail

Tip: For social network accounts, see "Add account" on page 11.

# Instant messages

Note: You might not have this feature. For details, ask vour service provider.

To send and receive instant messages, you can use the **IM** app, Google Talk<sup>TM</sup>, another instant messaging app, or your browser.

# Find it: 0 > In Talk

**Note:** Your IM options will depend on your IM provider. To browse instant messaging apps from your computer, go to <a href="www.android.com/market">www.android.com/market</a>.

#### Voicemail

When you have a new voicemail, shows at the top of your screen. To hear the voicemail, touch Dialer, then touch and hold

If you need to change your voicemail number, in the home screen touch Menu 🔐 > Settings > Call settings > Voicemail settings.



To change your text entry settings and see the dictionary of terms you've used, from the home screen, in the home screen touch Menu 📆 > Settings > Language & keyboard.

# Touchscreen keypad

When your phone is closed, you can open a display keypad by touching a text field, or touching and holding Menu (1). To close the keypad, touch Back (5).



Touch to open a keypad for symbols and numbers.

Touch Alt for more symbols.

To change your settings for this keypad, from the home screen, touch Menu B > Settings > Language & keyboard > Android keyboard.

### Text entry settings

When you use the touchscreen keypad, your phone suggests words from your dictionary and chosen language. Your phone also automatically enters apostrophes in some words, like "dont."

Find it: In the home screen touch Menu 🔛 > Settings > Language & keyboard

- To edit your dictionary, touch User dictionary.
- To change the language and the style for your touchscreen keypad, touch Select locale.
- To change the sounds, corrections, and other settings for your touchscreen keypad, touch Android keyboard.
- To change the automatic correction settings for your full keypad, touch **Device keyboard**.

#### Web

you don't need a computer, surf the web with your phone

**Note:** If you can't connect, contact your service provider.

#### Connect

Your phone uses the mobile phone network (over the air) to automatically connect to the Web.

**Note:** Your service provider may charge to surf the Web or download data.

To use a wireless network, in the home screen touch Menu [ ] > Settings > Wireless & networks. Touch Wi-Fi to turn it on, then touch Wi-Fi settings to

search for nearby wireless networks. Touch a network to connect. There's more in "Wi-Fi<sup>TM</sup>" on page 31.

# Web touch tips

#### Zoom & magnify

In Web pages, when you scroll (drag or flick), zoom icons appear at the bottom of your screen.



Tip: Use pinch-to-zoom to zoom in/out, see "Pinch-to-zoom" on page 6.

#### Select links

When you touch a link, your phone outlines it. If you touch and hold the link, your



phone shows options, like Cache or Mobile format.

### Browser options

Touch Menu 🔡 to see browser options:

options	
New window	Add a new browser window to your list.
Bookmarks	Shows a list of your bookmarks. Touch <b>Add bookmark</b> to add the current page to your list.
Windows	View the browser windows that are currently open.
Refresh	Reloads the current page.
Forward	Navigate to a previously viewed page.

- recording or watching videos, listening to music, or taking pictures.
- widgets that stream information to your home screen, like news or weather ("Use & change your home screen" on page 8).
- unused online accounts that you registered with MOTOBLUR ("Edit & delete accounts" on page 12).

- GPS. Wi-Fi™, and Bluetooth™ use: Touch and hold an empty spot on your home screen, then touch Motorola widgets > Bluetooth toggle, Wi-Fi toggle, or GPS toggle to view and control.
- Messaging Settings > Email > Email delivery > Fetch schedule > Every 15 minutes, Every 30 minutes, Every hour, Every 4 hours, or Manually.
- network speed: in the home screen touch Menu 🔛 > Settings > Wireless & networks > Mobile networks > Select network > 2G Only saves battery.
- network searching: if you are out of coverage, to keep your phone from looking for networks, press and hold Power (10) to open the Power key menu, then touch Airplane mode.





# Specific Absorption Rate (IEEE)

Your model wireless phone meets the governmental requirements for exposure to radio waves.

Your mobile device is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured to not exceed limits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. Government and by the Canadian regulatory authorities. The more immune your hearing aid is, the less likely you are to experience interference noise from mobile phones.
