2.6 Transmit Power Control (TPC)

U-NII devices operating in the 5.25-5.35 GHz band and the 5.47-5.725 GHz band shall employ a TPC mechanism. The U-NII device is required to have the capability to operate at least 6 dB below the mean EIRP value of 30 dBm. A TPC mechanism is not required for systems with an e.i.r.p. of less than 500 mW.

Maximum EIRP of this device is 38.726mW which less than 500mW, therefore it's not require TPC function.




5. Test Procedure

5.1 ADT DFS Measurement System

A complete ADT DFS Measurement System consists of two subsystems: (1) the Radar Signal Generating Subsystem and (2) the Traffic Monitoring Subsystem. The control PC is necessary for generating the Radar waveforms in Table 10, 11 and 12. The traffic monitoring subsystem is specified to the type of unit under test (UUT).

System testing will be performed with channel-loading using means appropriate to the data types that are used by the unlicensed device. The following requirements apply:

	a) The data file must be of a type that is typical for the device (i.e., MPEG-2, MPEG-4, WAV, MP3, MP4, AV etc.) and must generally be transmitting in a streaming mode.						
	b) Software to ping the client is permitted to simulate data transfer but must have random ping intervals.						
V	c) Timing plots are required with calculations demonstrating a minimum channel loading of approximately 17% or greater.						
	d) Unicast or Multicast protocols are preferable but other protocols may be used. The appropriate protocol used must be described in the test procedures.						



5.2 Calibration of DFS Detection Threshold Level

The measured channel is 5500MHz and 5510MHz and 5530MHz. The radar signal was the same as transmitted channels, and injected into the antenna of AP (master) or Client Device with Radar Detection, measured the channel closing transmission time and channel move time. The calibrated conducted detection threshold level is set to -64dBm. The tested level is lower than required level hence it provides margin to the limit.




6.2.1 Test Mode: Device Operating In Client without Radar Detection Mode

Client with injection at the Master. (The radar test signals are injected into the Master Device)

The modulation and bandwidth are similar for 802.11n mode for HT20 / HT40 and 802.11ac mode for VHT20 / VHT40, therefore investigated worst case for final test were chosen 802.11n (HT20 / HT40) and record in test report.

For a detection threshold level of -64dBm, the required signal strength at EUT antenna location is -64 dBm. The tested level is lower than required level hence it provides margin to the limit.














Radar Signal 0





6.2.3 Non-Occupancy Period




