

## APPENDIX I

## RADIO FREQUENCY EXPOSURE

### LIMIT

According to §15.247(i), systems operating under the provisions of this section shall be operated in a manner that ensures that the public is not exposed to radio frequency energy levels in excess of the Commission's guidelines. See § 1.1307(b)(1) of this chapter.

### **Remark:**

1. The maximum output power is 18.91dBm (77.7mW) at 2462MHz (with 7.53 numeric antenna gain.)
2. DTS device is not subject to routine RF evaluation; MPE estimate is used to justify the compliance.
3. For mobile or fixed location transmitters, no SAR consideration applied. The maximum power density is 1.0 mW/cm<sup>2</sup> even if the calculation indicates that the power density would be larger.

## TEST RESULTS

No non-compliance noted.



### Calculation

Given  $E = \frac{\sqrt{30 \times P \times G}}{d}$  &  $S = \frac{E^2}{3770}$

Where  $E$  = Field strength in Volts / meter

$P$  = Power in Watts

$G$  = Numeric antenna gain

$d$  = Distance in meters

$S$  = Power density in milliwatts / square centimeter

Combining equations and re-arranging the terms to express the distance as a function of the remaining variables yields:

$$S = \frac{30 \times P \times G}{3770d^2}$$

Changing to units of mW and cm, using:

$$P \text{ (mW)} = P \text{ (W)} / 1000 \text{ and}$$

$$d \text{ (cm)} = d \text{ (m)} / 100$$

Yields

$$S = \frac{30 \times (P/1000) \times G}{3770 \times (d/100)^2} = 0.0796 \times \frac{P \times G}{d^2} \quad \text{Equation 1}$$

Where  $d$  = Distance in cm

$P$  = Power in mW

$G$  = Numeric antenna gain

$S$  = Power density in mW / cm<sup>2</sup>

### Maximum Permissible Exposure

Substituting the MPE safe distance using  $d = 20$  cm into Equation 1:

Yields

$$S = 0.000199 \times P \times G$$

Where  $P$  = Power in mW

$G$  = Numeric antenna gain

$S$  = Power density in mW / cm<sup>2</sup>



**IEEE 802.11b mode:**

EUT output power = 77.1mW

Numeric Antenna gain = 2.51

$\rightarrow \text{Power density} = 0.0385 \text{ mW/cm}^2$

**IEEE 802.11g mode:**

EUT output power = 34.4mW

Numeric Antenna gain = 2.51

$\rightarrow \text{Power density} = 0.0172 \text{ mW/cm}^2$

**draft 802.11n Standard-20 MHz Channel mode:**

EUT output power = 77.7mW

Numeric Antenna gain = 7.53

$\rightarrow \text{Power density} = 0.1164 \text{ mW/cm}^2$

**draft 802.11n Wide-40 MHz Channel mode:**

EUT output power = 74.2mW

Numeric Antenna gain = 7.53

$\rightarrow \text{Power density} = 0.1112 \text{ mW/cm}^2$

*(For mobile or fixed location transmitters, the maximum power density is 1.0 mW/cm<sup>2</sup> even if the calculation indicates that the power density would be larger.)*
